Strengthening Women's Land Rights



Five Lessons from Using MAST to Advance Women's Land and Resource Rights

In this blog, Ioana Bouvier and Janet Nackoney of the USAID Land and Resource Governance Division highlight how USAID is helping to address long-standing inequities in women's land rights through its Mobile Applications to Secure Tenure (MAST). MAST engages local communities—with specific focus to the inclusion of women and youth as trusted local community members—who are trained to use maps and mobile devices to identify and record individual and communal land boundaries, land use, and ownership information.






<u>Incorporating Land and Resource Governance in</u> <u>Other Development Sectors: Reference Sheet Series</u>

Land and natural resources are discrete, finite, and fundamentally important assets. In developing countries, they constitute a substantial part of personal and national wealth. A country's approach to land and resource governance (LRG) contributes significantly to its broader socio-economic development. LRG is increasingly recognized as a foundational component of many key environment and sustainable development strategies, and effective LRG strategies at all scales can contribute to achieving positive human well-being and environmental outcomes.

Each reference sheet in this series briefly outlines existing evidence on the links between LRG and an adjacent development topic—and provides practical guidance for integrating LRG considerations across the Program Cycle. See the series:

New Case Studies on Mobile Applications to Secure Tenure (MAST)

<u>A Decade in the Making: The Evolution of Mobile Applications to Secure Tenure</u>
(MAST) - This case study examines the evolution of the MAST approach, from conception to piloting, assessment, and scaling. This work demonstrates how MAST can be used to address issues including poverty reduction, women's empowerment, conflict prevention, and food security.

<u>Leveraging MAST in Natural Resource Management: Cross-Sectoral Uptake</u>
<u>Throughout Tanzania</u> - This case study examines cross-sectoral applications of MAST beyond land tenure to sectors ranging from conservation to water and sanitation.

USAID's Integrated Land and Resource Governance program is a flexible field support mechanism that works with USAID Missions to provide both shortand long-term assistance. Quote from the field: "We are very happy that despite being 'Mtengwa' and very elderly widows, we have been granted the opportunity to register land. We will no longer be living in fear of land grabbing." - After the death of their polygamous husband, Ms Sulitha Ziyenda (62) and Ms Zujati Wilson (82) kept living together in his land in Mpozera village in Malawi with several children and grandchildren. One of the women has vision and hearing health disabilities. Under the ILRG project, the two women have registered the land their husband left them, also registering all their children as landholders, including stepchildren.





USAID's <u>Integrated Natural Resource Management</u> activity provides on-demand support services and technical assistance for USAID Missions, Bureaus, and Independent Offices across a wide array of environmental and natural resource management issues, with a focus on gender equality and social inclusion.
